

Brooklyn Jewry Celebrates Feast Of Rosh ha-Shanah

New Year Services Ushef in 10-Day Ceremonies to End With Yom Kippur

Rosh ha-Shanah, the Jewish New Year, was solemnly ushered in at sundown last night in every Brooklyn synagogue, orthodox and reformed, and in many improvised places of worship erected in theaters and halls throughout the borough.

Services will be resumed tonight, and the celebration will continue for 10 days, ending with the most solemn feast day in the Jewish calendar, Yom Kippur, or the Day of Atonement, on Oct. 2.

Special appeals were made last night from the pulpits of 25 synagogues for an increase in membership of the Brooklyn Federation of Jewish Charities.

Hospital Services

More than 300 patients attended the holiday services in the auditorium of the Jewish Hospital at Prospect Place. Services were also held at the Beth Moses Hospital, 401 Hart St., where Rabbi Aaron Burack officiated.

Sheriff Aaron L. Jacoby, executive director of the Brooklyn Hebrew Orphan Asylum, conducted services at the home, 373 Ralph Ave., for the 850 children housed there. Many of the alumni of the asylum participated in the worship and in the special holiday dinner which followed.

Special Deaf Mute Service

A special service for deaf mutes was held at the Hebrew Educational Society, Hopkinson and Sutter Aves., under the direction of the Brooklyn section of the National Council of Jewish Women. Rabbi Alter Landesman officiated, assisted by I. David Satlow.

More than 250 patients of the Jewish Sanitarium for Incurables, 86 E. 49th St., and a large number of friends and relatives who visited them, celebrated the holiday in the main auditorium of the sanitarium.
